Plan Ahead For The 2021 National Grange Convention To Be Held In Wichita, Kansas — November 9-13, 2021

Colorado is one of the five states in the Great Plains region who will be hosting the 2021 Convention with Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Texas.

For many attending a National Grange convention is a once in a life time experience. It's a great opportunity to connect with Grange members from around the nation. Every Grange member can sit in the National Grange meeting and enjoy the debate and process.

There are usually workshops to participate in, exhibits to look at, awards given, Evening of Excellence (Talent Show), and an opportunity to take your seventh degree, the degree of Ceres. The sixth degree is also presented for those who haven't had the opportunity to take it. One will need to have the fifth degree before being able to take the 6th and 7th degrees.

The **Peterson Brothers** have been requested to come to the convention to the Ag Luncheon, do some Youth workshops and a concert which will be open to the public. Details on cost to Grange members is being worked

Hosting also carries responsibilities and opportunities for Grange members to serve. At some point in time there will be a "sign up genius" online for individuals to select a time to help out. For those of you who are computer literate you can do this on your own; for others if you want to volunteer but need assistance you'll be able to contact Cindy Greer or Elizabeth Hiner and we will get you signed up. So what are the opportunities to help out.

1. Hospitality Room – each state will be responsible for the Hospitality room at least one day, but since there are only five states we may have to help at additional times. The times the Hospitality room will be open will vary on what the hotel allows. It's usually only for snacks between meals. Right now Colorado will host the Hospitality room on Wednesday, we may need donations of cookies and

snacks, but that too will depend on what the hotel allows.

2. Deputies – when the National Grange is in session (open for business) 2 to 4 individuals will be needed to "guard" the doors, making sure that only members or special guests are permitted in the meeting. Tuesday is the only day that the deputies need to be seventh degree members. The remainder of the days and evening community Grange members can serve as deputies as the National Grange opens in the fourth degree (Community).

3. Seventh Degree Preparation **Team** – several members are needed to launder and iron costumes for the

care of Tuesday and Wednesday.

4. Overseeing the Exhibit Rooms - two members per shift are needed to oversee the exhibit rooms and making sure that none of the exhibits are removed without permission from the

5. Registration Team will help all the Grangers who attend the convention with registration. Each Granger registered receives a name tag, schedule and tickets that have been preordered. One may need to know how to type or make name tags.

6. Sixth Degree Officers – The host region is responsible for putting on the sixth degree. Officers will be

seventh degree, which has been taken needed and expected to dress as requested by Texas, who is in charge of the degree. Texas has a rose drill team and is planning on filling the Master's/ President's office. Parts do not have to be memorized but should be read with expression and smoothly. Officers will be doing an entrance drill, so marching is required.

Colorado State Grange has set aside some funding to help members who volunteer to help at the convention with expenses. We'll let you know what you need to do to receive some of those funds.

In October, 40,000 Christmas cards were sent to Washington, D.C., to a non-profit organization called Soldiers and Sailors of America. Each card had a hand written message such as "God Bless You" or Thank you for YOUR service," as well as an insert about Grange and Scarlett O'Hatters, red hat group. They will process the cards and mail them to military bases and ships all over the world for our troops. This is a very small thank you to them and lets them know that we know they are out there in over 22 countries and show our gratitude. There are over 160,000 troops out

This was a Darden Pomona and Scarlett O'Hatter's project but this year was different. Due to the pandemic we could not have large gatherings to write the cards. However, people took them home and wrote them. Marlys was never bored during the pandemic as she wrote cards almost daily and Lois Painter, who is legally blind, and also a Maple Grove Grange member, stuffed 15,000 cards. Others bought cards and wrote them and sent them to Marlys. Among those were Colorado State Grange President Cindy Greer, Lecturer Elizabeth Heiner, Jeanne Davies, and several others



who bought and signed cards for this project. Her niece sent 800 signed cards from Washington state. Pleasant Park Grange bought many cards as well as took cards home from the meeting and prepared them. Booth Wheat Ridge Grange and Enterprise Grange had a card signing at one of their meetings. The 94 year old mother of the lady who paid for the cards

to be shipped last year has written over 500 cards in her spare time.

Many thanks for all the help in this project. This has been a difficult year for all but especially those who protect our freedom. The second week of December the cards were sent "Priority Mail" to the military bases and ships so they would be there before


Janet Union

2021 — a New Year with new hopes and dreams. What new dreams does your Grange have. If you're one who hasn't met in another method other than in person you might need to investigate how you can make a change. We are all hoping that there will be a vaccine so that we can move forward, but if there isn't we're going to have to find ways to move forward. Many Granges across the nation and even in our own state have had meetings via ZOOM or some other video platform, conference call meetings, or conducted business via

email. It's not as much fun as it is when we get together, but we at least get business taken care of. Those Granges who have met via a different platform are to be congratulated. It's encouraging to hear of Granges who are having fundraisers and seeing their communities support them even though it may be drive thru events, curb side delivery of meals or virtual silent auctions, etc.

The Colorado State Grange Officers and Directors are hoping to offer a virtual Super Grange Event in March or April where each department will share programs and tips to help local Granges promote the programs and projects. Stay tuned for more information as it comes available.

In November the National Grange held its first virtual convention. There were 52 delegates who discussed resolutions and elected two executive committee members. The election was held using a system called Survey Monkey. Each voting delegate received an email with a link to the survey in which they could cast their vote. Each voting delegate had to have their own email address. Ten state Granges are allowed only one voting delegate because they don't have enough local Granges to qualify for two delegates. Each delegate was sent a voting paddle that was green on one side with a thumbs up and the other side was red with a thumbs down. We spent two days on Zoom meetings which began at 10 a.m. Mountain time, ended at 2 p.m. then started again at 4 p.m. and ended around 8 p.m. or later each day. There were 15 past delegates remembered in the Memorial Service.

Ninety-seven resolutions were considered. Each committee met prior to the convention at least one time to review policy statements and the resolutions for their committee. Thirty of those resolutions were adopted. Eight were included in Policy statements. Twelve were considered Present policy. Several were combined with similar resolutions or rewritten and covered by another resolution. One was considered a state issue. Eight were rejected on the floor. Fourteen were reported as adverse by the committees.

The resolutions that Colorado sent were included in the Grange Law policy statement and the amendments to section 4.10.6 in the National Grange Digest of Laws was adopted. The Feasibility Study committee for a video of the first four degrees presented an initial report and because COVID curtailed accessibility to resources were granted another year to finish the study. It appears that it could be quite expensive to have the degrees produced even with qualified volunteers willing to pay their own expenses to participate. They also felt that there would be a fundraising process to help pay for the production if the National Grange was not in a position to provide the funds. I'm willing to send the report to anyone who is interested in reading the report.

Our resolution on a round table format for meetings was included in the policy statement. "The Grange law committee would like to acknowledge the vigorous discussions occurring in many Community and Pomona Granges across the country regarding the relevance of the traditional ceremonies being used in our local Grange chapters. This is especially true for the physical performance aspects of the ceremonies involving hall setup/takedown, marching, standing/sitting as well as tasks like presenting the flag, taking up the password, and opening the Bible on the altar. These discussions manifested themselves this year in resolutions presented to this committee from three different states asking the National Grange to formally sanction informal "round table" meeting formats that would curtail or eliminate the physical performance parts of our ceremonies for opening, conducting and closing our regular meetings. After vigorous discussion, the committee decided not to endorse these requests this year. However, the Grange Law Committee also strongly felt that some degree of guidance from the National Grange was appro-

Therefore, the Grange Law Committee urges that the traditional opening and closing ceremonies or the approved alternative opening and closing ceremonies always be used, whenever possible. The Grange Law Committee further urges that recitation of the verbal portions of either the traditional opening and closing or the approved alternative opening and closing ceremonies must be used, regardless of the whether or not that Grange can regularly follow the physical performance portions of these ceremonies, because at a bare minimum, these verbal recitations are necessary in order to legally conduct business as a Grange.'

PICK GRANT APPLICATION FOR GRANGE SUPPORT

Granges who need funds to do their #1 Community Service project or to assist with an emergency relief effort in their community, publicizing events, or recruiting new members, updating the technology available at their Grange Hall, sponsoring quality workshops for the Grange members by hiring professional presenters or starting a Grange Garden, Community garden or building landscaping or just paying utility bills will need to provide details about plans and what the project will cost. Information has been sent out to Grange Secretaries and Masters on how to apply, but you can also find the information on the State Grange Web site or e-mail or call me and I will send you a copy of the application. Grants will be awarded after the PICK board has reviewed the application. Only one grant will be awarded to a Grange.

Granges must provide their current financial status and current bills when applying for funds to assist with utilities or a specific need for the building. If you have a savings account, invested funds, or CD's your chances of receiving a grant are less likely because we only have a certain amount that we can award that has not already been designated.




Well winter is finally in full swing. Hopefully we still have some snow on the ground, and lots of moisture in the mountains.

Conservation Reserve Program -USDA, "CRP" Providing and protecting natural lands

The CRP is a voluntary program for agricultural landowners to place their lands under approved conservation methods on parcels where natural conditions are allowed to develop. The land owner receives rental payments and cost-share funding to establish the CRP lands that are then not cropped. Public access is available for hunters, hikers, and anglers. Payments benefit the landowners and provide economic drive for local communities where outdoors people visit.

Under the CRP millions of acres of land are protected from erosion and native or natural habitat is encouraged. Participant's contacts extend for 10 to 15 years. Plus, the recreation benefit supports jobs, state and local taxes, and, in 2016 \$57.3 million in economic activity was generated. The program's return on investment averages \$5.20 in economic activity for each federal dollar invested. Nationwide three million acres are enrolled in the CRP. Source: Roosevelt Report News, Nov. 2020

Less acreage has been enrolled in CRP over the last few years so it will be important that the incoming administration be prepared to take action to strengthen this important program for ensuring healthy soil, water, and wildlife environment on private land. CRP funding is via the Farm Bill.

Per the USDA approximately two million acres of Colorado's CRP contracts will soon expire and if not renewed, will result in the natural habitats established to decrease, however, to move out of the CRP coverage, a plan is required to guide the changes to grazing, natural cover, cropping, etc. Recognizing this, technical assistance and financial assistance are available to owners who chose to transition into grazing uses. Assistance can include livestock pipelines, water tanks, fences, weed control, and wildlife habitat management. Threatened and endangered species must be identified and considered. The vast majority of our CRP lands are in eastern

Of interest, there is a prairie herd of elk that seems to have moved out from the Black Forest to inhabit agriculture lands north and south of I-70 east to Agate, Deer Trail, Limon, etc. Available CRP lands provide encouragement for the elk plus deer and pronghorn populations.

Redistricting Of Colorado's **Congressional Districts And Legislative Districts**

Our state's demographics continue to change drastically as people relocate here, especially the younger demographic who also appreciate our access to outdoor recreation. They largely are from urban areas, not from rural areas, and their attitudes reflect an urban life experience, not outdoors, not agriculture, not fishing, not hunting, but they may favor hiking, mountain biking, skiing, parks, and scenic drives. Our Front Range population will continue to drive much of Colorado's political expression in legislation and attitude. Registered voters increased by 760,000 since 2016, about 6% growth per year.

As you all may be aware, the initiative to introduce wolves into western Colorado was approved at the election this year. Colorado State Grange opposes the introduction. Approval of the vote was from the Front Range communities largely reflecting attitudes expressed above. The vote was opposed by rural counties. Our state's demographics are changed to favor our urban population which reflect a bias too often resulting in legislation and policies not favorable to Colorado's agricultural economy and to rural communities. This brings me in a round-about way to refer to the two independent redistricting commissions created from the 2018 elections charged with redrawing Colorado's Congressional and Legislative districts — I encourage you to carefully track what they do.

Each commission must have 12 members, four from each of the two largest political parties, Democrats and Republicans, and four who are not affiliated. Each commission must include at least one member residing in each current congressional district and at least one member from the Western Slope. Each commission must, to the extent possible, reflect Colorado's racial, ethnic, gender, and geographic diversity. Commissions members are chosen from a pool of applicants who submitted applications by the deadline in November. That process is underway now. A panel of retired judges will make the final commission member selections.

Could Colorado be allowed another Representative? Maybe if another state lost population. Congress is maxed at the current number of members at 435. Progress of the two commissions can be tracked via their web site (and you should sign up there to receive notices): https://redistricting .colorado.gov/faq.

I would like to see a reduction in the amount of urban influence in our state being exercised now but I doubt that can happen short of highly inventive districts to dilute the Front Range population influences by linking districts with as much of rural Colorado as possible. Can we try shoe string and dog bone shaped districts?

I encourage everyone to carefully track activities of the two commissions which should begin in February 2021, and when interim process steps are made public, ensure the proposals are what you want to see. You are allowed to submit maps and other



Our December 12 meeting was held at FarmBox Foods in Sedalia. The temperature was 22 degrees when the meeting began, so the dozen members and three visitors in attendance moved around to stay warm. Farm-Box offers "...ready to use, turn key, vertical hydroponic and gourmet mushroom farms" in semi-trailers that "can be used in any climate, any place in the world." One semi-trailer houses a mushroom farm. Farm Manager Trevor Garofalo gave a short talk on the facilities at FarmBox, then showed the mushroom-growing truck to four people at a time.

We also checked the semi equipped with vertical hydroponic tubes for growing lettuce and other vegetables which they will plant soon. Trevor sold \$5 bags of oyster mushrooms to many attendees; oyster mushrooms offer a higher protein content than regular button mushrooms according to Trevor. Nena Robbins, our lecturer, arranged to have him come to our January meeting for a longer talk about their growing process and discuss possibilities for our spring plant sale!

Several Grange members will join with Lea Marshall and other community members for a new book club beginning in January and continuing through June. The group will read and discuss six volumes of The Remarkable Ladies of Sedalia, stories of women who helped settle the town and preserve it, which were compiled by volunteers of Sedalia's Museum.

Sedalia's usual Santa Shop for children and Winterfest were not held this year. Our Grange focused on community giving. We held email discussions and votes to provide King Sooper gift cards for families of Sedalia Elementary's students. Linda Straw held a mini-food drive to stock the Little Pantry at Sedalia's Museum with dried and easily prepared foods and snacks.
