Harry, Cindy, Russell and Daniel and Jenna have served as state officers or directors during their years of membership. Harry and Cindy were delegates to the National convention this past year. Cindy is the State President and was elected National Grange Ceres for the next two years.

pleased to announce that GIA will again fund 25 scholarships for the 2018-2019 school year, totaling \$33,500. In addition, GIA is honored to award the \$1,000 Paul and Ethel Holter Memorial Scholarship, funded by a gift of Mrs. Holter's estate, and the \$1,000 Dee and Ina McKern Memorial Scholarship, funded by a gift from the McKern family.

Applicants may apply for either an academic or a vocational scholarship. Three of the awards will be for students wishing to pursue vocational studies and 22 awards will be for academic studies. The Chaplain was the spiritual leader for the farm. Secretary was responsible for the communication and Treasurer was responsible for the financial aspects of the farm. The Gatekeeper guarded the gate and made sure that anyone who came to the gate was there for the right reason.

The Steward and Assistants made sure everything was in proper order and the work carried out. The Grange founders added the Graces (Ceres, Pomona and Flora) to remind themselves that agriculture was important to daily life. Grain was needed for bread (Ceres), Flowers were needed for fruit (Flora) and the Fruit we enjoy from the plants sustain life (Pomona). There are many ways to explain the officers. The Executive committee made the decisions that needed to be made between meetings. Sometime we need to know our History in order to understand the Grange Way and it helps to realize that history in regards to the definitions that we put on words today.

Andrea Broomhall

November 15, 1929 -September 15, 2017

Andrea Ardeth Broomhall passed away peacefully Friday morning, September 15, 2017, at home with her daughter Lisa and her beloved dog Marley by her side.

Andrea was preceded in death by her parents Andrew Malcolm and Ruby Malcolm, her brother Darrell, her husband Everett Cole and her second husband William Broomhall, her granddaughter Ricci M. Padilla and her grandson Marcus Cole. Her son Kelly Cole passed away 10 days after his mother on September 25, 2017.

Andrea is survived by her daughter Lisa Cole and her husband John Sworder, her daughter Tracey Hagerbaumer and her husband Jay, their children Rico Padilla, Tiffany Stachura and her husband Matt, Amber and Joey Hagerbaumer, and her daughter-in-law Pam Cole and her son Christopher.

Andrea was born November 15, 1929, and raised in Deer Lodge, Montana, by Andrew Abram Malcolm and Ruby Rosamond Malcolm. Andrea was the baby of the family with one older brother Darrell. Andrea was referred to as "Sis" by her family and friends in Montana, but she never liked being called "Sis." She stated that she never understood why they didn't call her by her name.

Andrea attended the Colorado Women's College in Denver, because they offered horseback riding. On Andrea's first time out on a horse, the horse went back to the barn with her in the saddle. That was the end of Andrea's horseback riding days. She later went to the University of Wyoming to obtain a teaching degree. There she met Everett Jean Cole her husband. While living in Wyoming, she worked at the Air Force base in administration. After marrying in 1951 they moved to Pennsylvania, where Everett was a professor of Microbiology at the University.

While at the university they decided to start their family. After a time and many medical tests to discover that Andrea could or should conceive they took a different route in order to start their family. The Korean War was coming to an end, and as war often does, many orphans were a byproduct. Our parents went through an agency to adopt a child from the Korean War.

Due to political conflict with the university, Andrea and Everett were forced to work with another agency that assisted them in orchestrating the first inter-racially mixed adoption in Pennsylvania. Kelly, Andrea and Everett's oldest son was 3-years-old when he came to live with them. They later moved to Colorado, and again decided to add to their family. There they adopted Lisa, the first interracially mixed child to be adopted in Jefferson County. About two years later Lisa wanted a little sister and Tracey was joined into the Cole family.

The desire Andrea and Everett had to raise and love children was more important than what nationality or ethnic background the child came from. Through the years the issue of what nationality or color their children were, came up frequently. There were many discussions in the Cole home that were not happening in most of the other homes in Arvada. Deciding where to live, go to church even where they went grocery shopping became a conscious decision.

Andrea and Everett, who were raised through the depression years, received no special training or support to take on three inter-racially mixed children with varied, emotional and physical challenges, but they did it anyway. Everett passed away on Father's day. June 16, 1974, after having been ill for over two years leaving Andrea with two pre-teen girls. Andrea worked alongside Everett as he ran a laboratory, Biological Research Labs, next door to their home in Arvada. She continued running the lab with the help of their loyal employees until Andrea found a buyer for

ker named William "Bill" Broomhall the lab was sold and a new chapter began in Andrea's life. Bill and Andrea


were married in December 1977. Kelly, Lisa and Tracey had moved out of the house and Bill's son Mike and daughter Becky were living on their own, so Bill and Andrea did not have to work through many of the challenges that come with a blended family. Andrea again worked alongside her husband and received her real estate license, never actually selling anything, but having a better understanding of the business. Bill and Andrea traveled, to Hawaii, Alaska and Europe, went on cruises, went skiing, fishing and went to garage sales as if it were the weekly treasure hunts. And boy did they find treasures, or at least Bill found treasures. Bill passed away in July 1996.

Andrea will be remembered by Grange members as the pianist for over 50 years, a Golden Sheaf Member at Enterprise Grange #25 at 72nd and Simms. She also spent many years preparing the annual Christmas dinner, having the annual picnic in her backyard and writing short skits. Does anyone remember the nose rings for the reindeer? She assisted the children in singing or performing at Christmas time. Andrea was also a lifetime member of the Order of Eastern Star.

Of all the things that Andrea cherished, besides her children, she cherished DOGS and the home she lived in since 1962 the most. She always said she "just loved all dogs."

People Improving Communities and Kids in partnership with Golden Gate Grange has been awarded a \$10,000 grant for capital improvements. We received a phone call early in November of the award and the paperwork arrived December 1 along with the check.

PICK also applied to the La Plata Electric Roundup Foundation for a grant for the Junior Grange Night at the Zoo project. PICK was awarded \$500 for this project. We are asked to get at least five new La Plata Electric customers to sign up for the Roundup program. Please contact me if you are willing to sign up. La Plata Electric does not require a group to be a 501c3, so those in their service area are encouraged to apply to them for project funding. Does your electric provider have a similar program? It might be worth your time to check it out to see what you can get funding for.

There has been a bit of miscommunication which has created some issues. Unfortunately the email that was sent to me regarding the application to the Paul and Anna Lee White trust fund was lost in cyberspace and I did not receive it. Therefore, when I received the letter from the foundation I had no idea that it was intended for Golden Gate. That's why we started the campaign to raise \$5,000 in matching funds. Granges and Grangers have been very generous and PICK has received a total of \$2,950. (\$600 was designated for the Mandy Project).


Many foundations require that a letter of inquiry be sent first and then if they think your project is a good match for their funding purposes they will ask for a complete grant application, which includes a detailed budget for the project, the amount of funding we are requesting and a time line as to when the project will be complete.

- (Continued from Page 1) · Cut strip set in half, length-wise, to make 2 rectangles. Each rectangle should measure 5" x 8-1/2".
- Flip one rectangle around so colors are reversed.

White

- Use 100% cotton, solid white for the corners.
- Cut 4 squares, 2-1/2" x 2-1/2". Cut 2 squares, 5" x 5".
- **Constructing the Quilt Block:**
- Fold the four 2-1/2" white squares once on the diagonal and press the crease to mark a sewing line.
- Place a creased 2-1/2" white square on one corner of a 5" x 8-1/2" strippieced rectangle with right sides facing. Stitch on the sewing line, then trim the excess fabric 1/4" away from the sewn seam (A).
- Repeat for the adjacent side of the rectangle (B). Make 2 and sew them together vertically.
- Fold the two 5" white squares once




on the diagonal and press the crease to mark a sewing line (C).

- top of one lower corner of the block with right sides facing. Stitch on the marked sewing line, then trim the excess fabric 1/4" away from the sewn seam.



Stress your concerns about making the building as safe as possible by working positively with the fire inspector.

- A better maintained building for improved resale value or equity growth.
- A possible reduction in insurance



Cuban agriculture technology equals that of "Jesus time" and they have no parts for their few tractors and the same is true for their railroads. Don saw nitrogen needs in crops. Cuba gets 80% of its food from imports. Privatization is expanding slightly, restaurants can now seat 40, but were previously limited to 8 guests.

CDA is expanding relations with federal agencies. Last year a staff person was hired to outreach to the USFS, BLM, and Conservation Service and to Colorado Parks and Wildlife. One challenge is to ensure domestic sheep and big horn sheep can remain on the same range, commonly federal land. A new position will be added to review the daily Federal Register publications where Colorado might be impacted by new programs and rules.

We are pleased to announce that the Pier family of Centennial is the recipient of \$500 from the Mandy Project for their 9-week old son, Henry. The Piers were blessed with a perfect pregnancy after experiencing a miscarriage and long months of waiting

The pregnancy was uncomplicated and progressed wonderfully. They had hoped for an unmediated natural birth, but Henry had other plans. After his due date came and went, the doctor scheduled them for induction. Henry did not tolerate the induction well and they were rushed in for an emergency C-section.

After Henry arrived he struggled with some blood sugar issues and latching for breast feeding. After several weeks of struggling with issues they learned that he had lip and tongue tie, those were lasered. Henry seemed excessively fussy and unhappy, he was diagnosed with reflux and prescribed medication.

Henry failed the newborn hearing test at the hospital showed he had difficulties in his right ear. The hospital said not to worry sometimes it's just

fluid. He failed a second test and they were told that C-section babies often have fluid in their ears. Another test was done two weeks later which he failed. At that point they were referred to an audiologist who confirmed that Henry had moderate to severe hearing loss in his right ear.

After more tests they learned that his right ear hearing loss had worsened. Their medical insurance does not cover the cost of hearing tests or hearing aids, nor did it cover the dental visit for his tongue and lip tie. Cost of the hearing aids and fees is a little over \$2,800.

The family's goals for Henry are that he have the best chance at acquiring speech as close to developmentally appropriate as possible. They want him to grow up happy knowing that he can accomplish any of his dreams despite his hearing loss.


