





Autumn And Brooke Stevens



Autumn and Brooke Stevens, age 6

It's been quite some time since we've had any applications for the Mandy Project. We're excited when we do receive applications and can help families who have children with a hearing loss.

Autumn and Brooke Stevens are 6-1/2 month old twins with a hearing loss. They live with their parents in Thornton, Colo. The parents' goals are to aid both children with permanent hearing aids to assist in their development and be successful in their lives and to assist them in receiving vital information during their early childhood years when early language and literacy are most important. The aids recommended for the girls cost \$5,000 per child. Fortunately they qualify for CHIP and that covers \$3,000 per child. Leaving them with a balance of \$2,000 for each child.

Autumn was diagnosed with mild hearing loss in both ears that is essentially sensorineural. Brooke was identified with a severe to profound mixed hearing loss in her right ear and severe to mild mixed hearing loss in her left ear. The hearing loss is considered permanent and not surgically correctable in both girls, therefore hearing aids are medically and communicatively warranted. The hearing loss may have a significant impact on the children's speech-language development, psychosocial development, and educational achievement.

The Colorado State Grange awarded each child \$500 and PICK awarded each child \$250.

Blue Star — Entertainment: Programs/activities involving traveling outside your hall or meeting place for an event, special meal, art exhibit, play, or show, etc.

Green Star — Membership: Activities/programs promoting membership and recruiting new members.

Red Star — Community: Programs/activities specifically planned for the community.

Silver Star — Cooperation: Sponsor programs/activities cooperating with other community groups.

Orange Star — Family: Programs/activities oriented around the family or providing opportunities that are focused on the family.

Purple Star — Media: Creating publicity using social media or traditional media to promote Grange programs/activities and the Grange. Got Drugs??

Drug Disposal:

Many homes end up with unwanted or expired prescription and overthe-counter medications. Old prescriptions left in medicine cabinets or elsewhere in the home can often be an easy source for those who would like

to abuse prescription medications. Unneeded medicine may also cause confusion for people who are already taking a large number of medications. Furthermore, some medications, including **fentanyl patches**, should be properly disposed of by flushing to prevent accidental ingestion by chil-

dren and pets. Many states have year-round/pernanent drug take-bac lizing on-site drug disposal boxes or mail-back programs, or local medication take-back events that are held at temporary sites at different times through the year. The take-back programs are often facilitated by police departments, municipal buildings, or pharmacies.

Disposing Of Medication At Home

If a drug disposal site or mail-back program is not available in your area, it is best to follow Food and Drug Administration (FDA) guidelines for the safe disposal of unused or unwanted medications at home; including when to flush medication and

At a Glance

- 1. Check the label on your medication and follow any instructions for safe disposal provided.
- 2. Do not flush the drugs down the toilet unless the label says to flush



them. The list of drugs that should be flushed is available on the FDA website.

If there are no disposal instructions on the label, check with your local government to find out if specific disposal methods are required by law. If not, take them out of the container and mix them with an undesirable substance, such as used coffee grounds or cat litter. Next, seal the mixture in a

sealable bag. Did you know nearly 3.4 billion prescription drugs dispensed each year are taken improperly, and this can lead to adverse side effects, hospitalization, and even death?

The first step to taking medication safely is to discuss its risks and benefits with your doctor or pharmacist. Make sure you understand why you are taking a certain medicine and how it affects your body.

Before using prescription or overthe-counter (OTC) medications, read all warnings and follow dosing instructions precisely, including using

medicines may contain warnings

against eating or drinking certain foods as well as smoking. Other medications need to be handled with caution; such as fentanyl medication. Once you get home, it can be helpful to create a list of each medication that you take along with its strength, dose, and the prescribing doctor. The list can also help you check whether two or more of your medications contain acet-

overdose or liver damage (go to Know YourDose.org for more information). Always remember to never share

aminophen, increasing your risk of

your medications with anyone else. And remember to tell your doctor or pharmacist if you missed a dose, overdosed, or experience any side effects.

- Also Remember to turn on the lights and put on your glasses. It's easy to mistake one pill bottle for another. Make sure you double check and read the label every time.
- · Labeled pillboxes can help you remember to take multiple medications throughout the day. Be sure to keep any pillboxes out of reach of children.
- Use a calendar or medication record to help you remember whether you have taken your medications

"The Grange has always been nonpartisan, but that does not mean we are not interested in government and politics," National Master Betsy Huber in the Masters Corner of the *Good Day Magazine*.

The word "political" in Grange Law means partisan politics, and does not include or refer to general questions of political philosophy.

Officers of all Granges of the various divisions of the Order shall avoid the appearance of using their positions in the Order in any manner to influence the opinions of others on questions at issue between political parties or on candidates for political office.

Politics and legislation in a way are two different things. Politics focuses on the party. Legislation focuses on the law.

The Grange Declaration of Purposes emphatically states that the Grange is NON-PARTISAN. But what does that really mean and how does that affect what the Grange does?

The Grange as an organization does not in any way support a political candidate for office. In order to protect our tax exempt status the Grange must not in any way allow the Grange name or Grange property to be used in a way the might be viewed as supporting one political candidate or party. If the event is in the gray area — avoid it.

The Grange organization cannot donate money to a political candidate's campaign. The Grange cannot rent their building to one political candidate for a gathering that promotes his/her own political candidacy. If a political candidate wants to hold a town meeting at your Grange Hall, where no one person benefits from the meeting it is allowed. If your Grange sponsors or another group sponsors a Candidates Forum or a Meet the Candidates event where all candidates are invited regardless of party, it's considered educational.

Individual Grangers may support whomever they choose or however they choose, but one must be careful not to use their Grange membership in a way that might be viewed as the Grange. Over the years several State Grange Masters have at one time served in their state legislature. President Roosevelt was a Grange member, but he didn't jeopardize the Granges tax status in any way.

Granges can and should support candidate forums as long as all political parties are invited to participate.

*A Grange should never support any specific political candidate.

*Renting our Grange Halls to one political candidate inadvertently leaves others with the impression that the Grange supports that candidate, therefore a Grange should not rent their hall for a political candidate to raise funds or to even meet people in the community.

Agriculture Report

The following comments are drawn from websites for several lawmakers, in particular Representatives Joann Ginal and Jeni Arndt, plus Todd Engdahl, Capital Editorial Services, concerning agriculture related legislation approved at the session completed in May.

Colorado's severely underfunded transportation needs have been addressed by Senate Bill 18-001 (plus amendments) that commits nearly \$650 million over the next two fiscal years with a promise of \$50 million per year through 2039. While the bill funds a list of needed transportation projects, the majority of the funding (\$346.5 million) is dedicated to highways with the remaining 15% going toward alternate forms of transit, \$74.25 million for county and municipal projects, and \$74.25 to the new Multimodal Options fund. Via a ballot initiative in 2019, voters will be asked if they would like to pledge an additional \$2.34 billion for transportation bonds to further fund Colorado's transportation infrastructure. SB-18-001 will allow projects to get underway before the 2019 vote. This bill began at the very beginning of the session and did not emerge until very late with significant compromising by House Speaker Crisanta Duran (Democrat) and Senate President Kevin Grantham (Republican). Widening of I-25 between Castle Rock and Monument Hill to three lanes will complete a full length of three lanes from south Denver to Colorado Springs and should get underway this year.

Rep. Arndt's Mussel-free Colorado Act provides financing for the Parks and Wildlife Division's aquatic nuisance species program to inspect watercraft before they put in to Colorado waters. Absent this act, inspections of watercraft at entry of reservoirs, lakes and rivers may not have been possible with the result that reservoirs, in particular and where they store irrigation or municipal water, could have been closed to boating. Note that cuaga or mussel DNA has been detected in Dillon Reservoir water — I do not know how this is interpreted, are mussels present or what? It is a concern for that very important reservoir.

Rep. Arndt also sponsored three bills that were approved on use of reclaimed domestic water allowing its use for marijuana cultivation, for toilet flushing, and for food crops. Denver Water has long used reclaimed water for open space and park irrigation.

The vegetable growers are reporting serious farm staffing challenges for another year running per the Vegetable Growers News' grower survey. More than 53 percent of growers indicated they did not have adequate worker numbers for the 2017 season. That percentage matched the 2017 survey results that inquired about 2016 worker totals. Losses occurred with un-harvested produce and other crops being left in the field, crops harvested not under optimum timing, and spoilage in storage due to a lack of reliable workers. As a result, available workers have had to work longer hours and were performing field harvest duties they were not trained to do. Growers located in areas with fishing and tourism have had to compete with higher wages from those industries.

Tips On Writing An Airtight Lease Agreement


One of the best ways to protect your interests as a landlord of a Grange building is to have a written lease agreement. A properly constructed lease agreement can mean the difference between getting stuck with a problem tenant and having legal recourse to protect the property. You may want to check with an attorney who is well versed in landlord/tenant law before finalizing such a lease agreement. A professional will be able to assist you in determining your legal rights in many different situations.

As you write your lease agreement, here are 10 tips to help you create an airtight document that will protect you and the property.

1. Know the Law. Each state and a number of cities have different laws regarding the management of property, and rights of landlords and tenants. Familiarize yourself with these laws before writing your lease agreement. This will assist you in knowing exactly what you can and cannot put into an agreement.

2. Make it Clear. Confusing terms and a poorly written agreement can be misinterpreted, and may not hold up in court. Put your stipulations in easy-to-understand terminology, and explain anything that might be misconstrued.

- **3. Provide Confirmation of the Condition of the Unit.** The lease should recite that the unit is being leased is in good condition without damage or problems.
- **4. Restrictions.** Specify if you have any restriction. This will include the use of alcohol, pets on the premises, etc. Many landlords have absolute prohibitions.
- **5. Right of Entry.** Each state requires a specific amount of notice before a landlord may legally enter a



6. Spell Out What Will Happen to the Security Deposit. If you require your tenants to pay a deposit against damages, you'll need to specifically state what is considered "damage" to the dwelling.

7. Clearly State the Amount of Rent and Deposits. Include the amount you will be charging for rent and any deposit amounts in your rental agreement. State when the rent is due and when it is considered late. This will help prevent misunderstandings, and give you legal recourse if the tenant is continually late.

8. Repairs and What You Will and Will Not Cover. As a landlord, it is your responsibility to provide repairs for fixtures, heating and cooling equipment and included appliances. However, in the lease you can designate certain maintenance responsibilities on the part of the tenant. You can also hold the tenant responsible for repairs needed due to his or her negligence or wrongful acts.

9. Activity Restrictions. If you have a code of conduct, include this in your rental agreement. For example, if you do not allow loud music after a certain time or have other restrictions, add them to your rental agreement. This will provide your tenants with a clear idea of what they cannot do, and will protect your interests, should a tenant fail to follow your rules.

10. State What Will Happen if the Lease Agreement is Breached by the Tenant. For example, if the Tenant breaks the code of conduct or does not pay his or her rent on time, you can state that the landlord will have the right to terminate the lease and evict the tenant.


