Clarence Hunter and Dean Hiner are members of Florida Grange #306 and Tom Campion is a member of Marvel Grange #479. Mr. Hunter served in the U.S. Air Force with a rank of Staff Sergeant. We're at the beginning of the Grange year and time to be setting goals for the coming year.

A Dream written down with a date becomes a GOAL. A Goal broken down into steps becomes a PLAN. A Plan backed by ACTION becomes a reality.

What is SMART goal setting? SMART goal setting brings structure and trackability into your goals and objectives. Instead of vague resolutions, SMART goal setting creates verifiable paths toward a certain objective, with clear milestones and an estimation of the

goal's attainability. Every goal or objective, can be made S.M.A.R.T. and brought closer to reality.

What does S.M.A.R.T. goal setting stand for? Why not think of a small goal you want to set right now for your Grange. To make your goal S.M.A.R.T., it needs to conform to the following criteria: Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Relevant and Timely.

**Specific** — What exactly do you want to achieve? The more specific your description, the bigger the chance you'll get exactly that. Questions you may ask yourself when setting your goals and objectives are: What exactly do I want to achieve? Where? How? When? With whom? What are the conditions and limitations? Why exactly do I want to reach this goal? What are possible alternative ways of achieving the same?

**Measurable** — Measurable goal means that you identify exactly what it is you will see, hear and feel when you reach your goal. It means breaking your goal down into measurable elements. You'll need concrete evidence.

**Attainable** — That means investigating whether the goal really is acceptable to you. You weigh the effort, time and other costs your goal will take against the profits and the other obligations and priorities you have in life.

**Relevant** — The main questions: Why do you want to reach this goal? What is the objective behind the goal, and Will this goal really achieve that? Does this goal promote or support the mission of the Grange and specifically your Grange?

**Timely** — Make a tentative plan of everything you do. Everybody knows that deadlines are what make most people switch to action. So install deadlines, for yourself and your team, and go after them. Keep the timeline realistic and flexible, that way you can keep morale high. Being too stringent on the timely aspect of your goal setting can have the perverse effect of making the path of achieving your goals and objectives into a hellish race against time which is most likely not how you want to achieve anything.

Another thing that's very important when setting SMART goals, is formulating it POSITIVELY. Remember that what you focus on, increases. So when you focus on NOT doing something, all you think about is that thing. And it will increase.

We look forward to hearing and seeing the results of your Goals in the coming year.

One of the main responsibilities of the State Secretary is to keep the membership for the State Grange. The membership figures are used from the most current count ending August 2018. Every Granger would burst his or her buttons if they could examine the myriad of activities this organization brings to the communities across the State. Below is a quick overview of a few of them.

Florida Grange held an Ellis Island Re-enactment for fourth graders in their school district. They had a quilting bee and a beading class. Golden Gate Grange held a community pig roast and fundraiser for the Golden Gate Canyon Fire Department. They also held a bear box class and a fraud protection presentation. ## Grange Museum Closes

The Colorado Grange Museum is at the Plains Conservation Center in Aurora east of Denver. This last year the City of Aurora bought the Plains Conservation Center and have made it an Aurora City Park project. They wanted the Colorado Grange Museum to stay at the Plains Center and asked us to open for the special events,

open to the public, they had planned

for the summer. Several Board members did maintenance work and painting and cleaning and we were open for the special events. What we have been finding over the years we have been open is that we have an increasing number of people who use walkers or are not steady in walking, young mothers with strollers and toddlers, and wheelchair bound visitors. Our museum is not set up for these types of guests. We have tables with items out for people to look through, things that toddlers can pick up and put down somewhere else, and we would need to put in a handicap ramp on one of our entrances. If someone should fall against one of our tables or displays, or fall over something a toddler set down, our liability would be great.

Our Museum Board is limited in many ways and we have not been able to get interns or a curator to help us in recent years, and we have not had many takers from the Grange when we asked for volunteers to help with the museum. At the last Colorado

Grange Museum Board meeting the Board voted to close the museum. It does not seem we are helping the Colorado State Grange and it is becoming more difficult to be open for the

Granges or Grangers who have items at the museum that they want to claim can call Pat Ouick, at 303-690-7393 or Jeanne Davies at 730-379-5834 and make arrangements to pick them up. Colorado State University will take scrapbooks and any written material to store it and/or digitalize it for future research and reference.

Some Granges have offered to display artifacts in their halls and some items will be sent to the Western Slope for display in Granges there. The weather needs to be good to get to the museum so this fall and next spring we will be moving out items at the museum. There are many artifacts that will need a home.

The Colorado Grange museum was established in 1980. It was conceived by Gladys Inness, a longtime Granger, at the Glendale Grange. Gladys Story of Lakewood Grange became the first Curator and set up a very fine museum. When she could no longer do the work the Museum Board did most of the work of the museum with special help from Dorinda Dembroski and Karin Baron over the years.

I want thank Pat Quick, Audrey Maydew, David McCord and Gary Tobey, the present Museum Board, for their guidance on the Museum Board and work at the museum.

## What Is a Lease and Why Is it Important?

A lease is the contract between a landlord and a tenant. The lease sets forth the rights and responsibilities of both the landlord and the tenant. The lease allows the tenant to occupy and use, for a specific period of time, land and structures on that land. In return, the tenant generally pays a set rent. The lease may set forth other duties and responsibilities of the land-

Once the parties sign the lease both are bound by its terms. Landlords should select their leases with care. Before selecting a lease, a landlord may wish to consult with an attorney who regularly handles landlord and tenant matters.

Unless the lease contains illegal can be assumed.

## Disadvantages of a Written Lease?

The advantages of a written lease are generally considered to be certainty and clarity. The lease sets the rent for the lease term. Unless the language of the lease states otherwise, rent cannot be increased during the lease term. A lease spells out the obligations of the tenant and landlord. If there are any disputes between the tenant and the landlord, the lease represents what was agreed upon by the parties. Where there is not a written lease, there are often misunderstandings between the tenant and landlord. The primary disadvantage of a lease is that it binds the tenant to the premises for a specified amount of time. Leases can be made for any length of time, so you could ask the landlord if the lease could be written for the time period you expect to use the Grange Hall.

A tenant who occupies rental property with the landlord's consent and makes rent payments without a written lease is called a "tenant-at-will." Colorado landlord-tenant law, including eviction laws and security deposits laws, still apply. A tenant-at-will has the right to occupy and use the rented premises subject to any restrictions upon which the landlord and the tenant have agreed. Because there is not a written lease, Colorado law regulates the type of notice which a tenant-at-will and the landlord of the tenant-at-will must give to terminate or change the original rental agreement. A tenant must give thirty (30) days notice to the landlord to terminate or

## Lease Before Signing It?

Although many leases are similar, there is no such thing as a "standard" lease provided or approved by any public agency or court. Lease agreements differ from landlord to landlord. Therefore, it is very important for the tenant to read the lease carefully before signing it. The lease is a legal document which defines the relationship between the landlord and the tenant. Both the landlord and the tenant will be held to the language of the lease.

## When Should the Tenant Get a Copy of the Lease?

It is a good idea to give a copy of the lease to the tenant before signing so that they will have a chance to review it. A tenant should be given a copy of the lease and any rules or regulations referred to in the lease after both the landlord and tenant have signed. If the landlord does not voluntarily give the tenant a copy of the lease and rules and regulations, the tenant should request a copy in writing. Since the lease spells out the tenant's and landlord's responsibilities, it is important for both parties to have a copy of the lease to answer any questions. Keep your lease in a safe place.







## **Agriculture** Report

My thanks to the delegates, officers and friends who reviewed and acted on the two Ag Committee resolutions presented at the recent State Session in Durango. Delegates voted to oppose two ballot issues that are on the November election ballot, Amendment 74, compensation for reduction in fair market value of property by governmental law or regulation, and Amendment 112 that would increase setback requirements to 2,500 feet from oil and natural gas development and redevelopment. Colorado voters will vote on these two amendments and 11 other state amendments and propositions in the November elec-

In my opinion, while Amendment 74 was largely intended to compensate owners of oil and gas rights where local or state governments might impose restrictions on well development, the amendment, promoted by the Farm Bureau and the oil and gas industry, could have far reaching negative impacts on all government actions where a reduction in property value might result. The local or state government would be on the hook for that reduction in value and the cost on all levels to compensate property owners could reach billions of public dollars. Plus, legal challenges would no doubt be many, lengthy, and expensive.

Implementation of Amendment 112 would close down most of the state to oil and gas development given the many protected sites and areas the 2,500-foot setback is measured from. This distance would have many, many overlapping areas of coverage measured from occupied structures, and areas designated as vulnerable including recreation areas, water sources, canals, reservoirs, lakes, streams (whether flowing or not), and any other area designated by the state or local government as vulnerable. Federal lands would not be affected. State school lands would be affected from which money generated by oil and gas leases is directed to public schools. That money would be cut-off if 112 were approved.

## Other Ag Items

Per Colorado Commissioner of Ag Don Brown, "Colorado currently has the largest hemp acreage in the nation

at about 30,000 acres." Hemp has wide Colorado interest due to the plant's drought hardiness and commodity potential but it is still federally classified as a Schedule 1 drug even though Colorado hemp is closely monitored to ensure it has minimal THC, the active ingredient in pot. The new farm bill could change hemp's illegal designation and if supported, hemp would then be treated like any other ag commodity, allowing it to be produced without federal strictures and presumable able to move in interstate commerce.

## NAFTA and the new USMCA (U.S.-Mexico-Canada Agreement)

Also from Commissioner Don Brown, Mexico and Canada are top importers of Colorado corn, wheat, hay, and potatoes. Mexico's recent tariffs apply to processed potatoes, like French fries, which leaves Colorado's fresh potato exports to Mexico unscathed but there may be unknown impacts from trade concerns beyond NAFTA. China placed tariffs on U.S. soybeans, not big in Colorado, but could cause all U.S. soybean farmers to grow other crops, possibly potatoes, adding a market for Colorado seed potatoes but also may create competition down the road.

Staff from the Colorado Department of Agriculture flew to Cuba to begin market discussions for Colorado agricultural products with a potential market for seed potatoes, potatoes, and affordable beef cuts. The Department is also looking at marketing elsewhere in the Caribbean including the Dominican Republic and other Caribbean countries.

## **Drought Summary:** October 9, 2018

Much of the Intermountain West has experienced a needed weather pattern shift for the beginning of Water Year 2019. Precipitation of 1-2 inches has been measured for most of the Upper Colorado River Basin and some areas received between two and four inches since October 1. For much of Utah and western CO, this equates to greater than 400% of average moisture for this time of year (though the region remains droughty).

On Tuesday, October 2, we went as a Grange to the Baldpate Inn located seven miles south of Estes Park for lunch and their Key Museum tour. It is a classic mountain getaway perched on Twin Sisters Mountain at 9,000 ft. offering spectacular views, intriguing history and fresh food.

The Baldpate Inn started with a married couple Gordon and Ethel Mace and Gordon's two brothers, Charles and Stuart Mace in 1911. Initially only a small Homestead cabin was built on the land and rhubarb was planted to fulfill the requirements of the Homestead Act. In order to supplement their income, the Mace family built several small tourist cabins which proved to be a huge success so the family made plans to build an inn. With their homestead patent registered as complete on January 22, 1917, the family officially opened The Baldpate Inn.


With financial resources being very limited, the Mace family used their talents with what natural resources were available and constructed the inn from hand-hewn timber cut from the property. Massive stone fireplaces were built to provide warmth and hot water. The Baldpate was opened boasting such amenities as hot running water, electric lights, and indoor plumbing!

The Inn was named after the mystery novel, "Seven Keys To Baldpate" by Earl Derr Biggers, who upon visiting the property stated that the inn was so similar to what he had imagined that the Baldpate Inn would become the "real" Baldpate Inn. In the novel, each of seven visitors traveled to the closed-in-wintertime hotel, and thinks that each has the only key to the Inn. In keeping with the story line of the novel, the Mace family gave each visitor to the Inn their very own key.

This tradition continued until the outbreak of World War I, when the price of metal became so expensive that the owners were no longer able to give keys away. The loyal guests who returned yearly were so disappointed that they began their own tradition of bringing a key back to the inn with them each year. It is said that the competition between guests became so fierce to bring the best and most exotic key each year that the Maces decided to begin a display of all the keys that the visitors brought.

This was the beginning of the world's largest key collection. The collection boasts over 20,000 keys including examples from the Pentagon, Westminster Abby, Mozart's wine cellar, and even Frankenstein's castle to name a few. We left a key to Enterprise Grange #25 to add to their collection! Everyone enjoyed the outing and we were sure glad to have made it before they closed for the sea-

## EHEW-1 RECOGNIZING OPIOID ABUSE

RESOLVED, that, as Colorado State Grange recognizes the opioid abuse crisis, we encourage all Granges within the state to join any local efforts to educate their individual communities.

## GA-1 COLORADO STATE GRANGE SCHOLARSHIPS

RESOLVED, that the Colorado State Grange Scholarship and Leadership Foundation consider awarding scholarships to qualified Colorado Grange students who wish to attend out of state institutions.

## GOTO-1 E-MEMBERSHIP DUES

- RESOLVED, that Section 4.6.15 of the Digest of Laws be replaced with the following language: "(F) E-Membership. Membership in the National Grange and in a State Grange as an E-member may be attained by individuals or families who may have an interest in the advancement of agriculture, improvement of rural life, and policies and principles of the organization. Membership is gained by completion of the approved membership form and paying the annual dues for this class of membership directly to the National Grange, under the terms and conditions provided for by the National Grange.
- (A) E-members will receive such information, publications, programs, benefits and services from the National Grange, in such manner, as shall be determined by the National Grange. In addition, State Granges, may, at the discretion of each individual State Grange, extend the benefits of information, publications, programs, benefits and services provided by the State Grange to its Subordinate, Pomona or Junior members to the E-members who reside in their state, in such a manner and under such terms and conditions, as shall be determined by the respective State Granges. E-members shall not be entitled to vote on matters of Grange policy or compete in National Grange sponsored contests that are designed for the benefit of Subordinate Grange members only.
- (B) The National Grange shall report, via electronic communication, to the various State Granges, on a quarterly basis, the contact information of all active E-memberships within their jurisdiction, provided that State Granges may not sell, barter, exchange or otherwise provide this information to any entity outside the jurisdiction of this Digest of Laws without the expressed approval of the National Grange. Individual or family E-memberships may be terminated by the Executive Committee of the National Grange for improper conduct, illegal action, conflict of interest or other reasons that the Executive Committee may determine are taken for the Good of the Order." and be it further

- RESOLVED: that Section 4.8.2 (F) in the Digest of Laws be replaced with the following language:
- "(F) E-Membership. The annual dues for E-Memberships will be forty dollars (\$40.00) for individuals and eighty dollars (\$80.00) for families, to be paid directly to the National Grange.
- (1) A. Dues will be divided as follows: \$32.50 to the National Grange, \$7.50 to the State Grange for individual E-Memberships and \$65.00 to the National Grange and \$15.00 to the State Grange for family memberships for E-members who reside within a state with an active, chartered State Grange.
- B. For the purpose of this subsection only, Potomac Grange #1 in Washington, DC shall be entitled to receive the State Grange portion of the annual dues for E-members who reside within the District of Columbia.
- C. One hundred percent of all E-Membership dues collected from E-members who reside in any state or territory of the United States without an active, chartered State Grange, or who reside outside of the United States, shall remain with the National Grange, provided that the National Grange Executive Committee, may, by annual vote, on a case by case basis, elect to share the State Grange portion of E-Membership dues collected from residents of any US states or US territories, with State Granges that have been assigned jurisdiction by the National Grange to organize and manage the affairs of the Order in a neighboring state or territory without an active chartered State Grange.
- (2) At the end of each calendar quarter, the National Grange will forward to each respective State Grange entitled to receive them, the annual State Grange portion of E-Membership dues collected from residents of their respective states during the previous quarter. All transfers of dues funds from E-Memberships within the various divisions of the Order entitled to receive them shall be by means of electronic funds transfers, unless both the sender and receiver agree to other alternatives."
- WHEREAS, the National Grange is proposing to increase the membership dues for E-members only. Therefore be it

RESOLVED, that Colorado State Grange approve the increase for E-members.

## GOTO-2 CSG EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE QUORUM

RESOLVED, that the Colorado State Grange constitution be amended as follows: A quorum shall consist of any two voting members **and** the State Master or State Overseer. At a scheduled meeting if the State Master is unable to be present the Overseer shall assume the responsibilities. All members of the Executive Committee shall be notified of any regular or special meetings.

## GOTO-3 STATE SESSION QUORUM

RESOLVED, that when a quorum is not reached, the requirement for a quorum may be suspended by a vote of the delegates present with the approval of three Executive Committee members.

## GOTO-4 ROUND TABLE FORMAT FOR GRANGE MEETINGS

RESOLVED, that the Colorado State Grange continue to encourage Granges to use the Ritual format and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Colorado State Grange adopt the Grange Round Table format as a pilot project.



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
